



King County Farmers Markets: 2023/2022

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Farmers Markets Overview

This report provides primary data on farmers markets in King County, Washington, quantifying their important roles in local food economies, community life, and as a key partner in food access programs. Data is collected by the Washington State Farmers Market Association (WSFMA) through an annual membership application and secondary online survey for farmers markets that are not currently members. The data source is the Washington State Farmers Market Association unless otherwise noted. Reported data is presented for King County as a whole and disaggregated for farmers markets in the City of Seattle and those that are in King County but outside of Seattle

Number of Farmers Markets. In 2023, there were 39 farmers markets in operation in King County and there are 40 in 2024 (Appendix 1). A farmers market is defined as a temporary event at a unique location with an average of at least 5 farm vendors over the season. Keeping the focus on agriculture, most of the aggregated vendor sales at a farmer market should be from farms and processors using agricultural ingredients grown/harvested in WA¹. Currently, 87% of farmers markets in King County are members of the Washington State Farmers Market Association.





Figure 1. King County Farmers Markets by Type of Organization, 2023 (n=39)

Farmers Market Organizations. The 39 farmers markets in King County are managed by 25 independent organizations or municipalities; 69% are nonprofit organizations, while 21% are run by a government agency such as a city or Public Development Authority, and a smaller proportion (10%) are for-profit entities (Figure 1). How a farmers market is incorporated has a direct relationship to its mission, its capacity for staffing, physical infrastructure, and ways in which operational funds are raised.

Farmers Market Sizes. Farmers markets have a wide range of market days per year, numbers of vendors, and number of shoppers. To compare market size, the "number of vendors on a typical market day during peak season" is used and serves as a proxy for the market footprint and management needs. King County has a range of farmers market sizes, from "very small" with 10 or less vendors, to "large" with 51 to 100

vendors and "very large" with over 101 vendors on a typical day during peak season (Figure 2). The size of a farmers market has a direct relationship to the management structures and complexity it needs, as well as its ability to recruit and retain vendors.

Market Days. In King County, farmers markets were open, on average, 24 days a year with all but one farmers market operating one day a week. Pike Place Market operates 7 days a week; however, it is classified as a Public Market and not a farmers market. Pike Place Market hosts seasonal satellite or express markets in nearby neighborhoods which are classified as farmers markets.




Figure 3. King County Farmers Market by Number of Days Open, 2023 (n = 39)

King County Farmers Markets are Growing

In 2023, King County farmers markets collectively reported a record of over \$40 million in sales, an increase of 18% from the prior year. These are aggregated sales from all vendors and represent direct, retail sales for hundreds of independent, small businesses. While aggregated sales at farmers markets in Seattle are greater, sales at farmers markets outside of Seattle reported a greater year over year increase of 26%.

The total sales of farm vendors (businesses that raise or grow everything they sell or make into valueadded products) at King County farmers markets was over \$22 million in 2023, an increase of 12%. Most (75%) farm vendor sales are at farmers markets in Seattle; however, farm vendor sales at farmers markets outside of Seattle increased 15%, greater than the county-wide and Seattle rate.

In 2023, King County farmers markets reported record number of market days. The combined number of market days totaled 945, an increase of 5%. Each farmers market day is an opportunity for shoppers to buy directly from vendors, and for vendors to connect one-on-one with shoppers and create real-time, retail sales. More and more farmers markets are adding a harvest, holiday, or winter market to extend their seasonal schedule. The farmers markets' sales averaged \$42,782 per market day in King County, an increase of 12%;

While difficult to reliably estimate, King County farmers markets collectively reported over 2 million shoppers in 2023. This is an increase of 9% and shows that more people love their farmers market every year.

King County Farmers Markets are Vital to the Local Food Economies

Farm vendors collectively represent the largest portion of King County farmers market sales (55%). The total reported number of farm vendors selling at King County farmers markets in 2023 was 839, an 11%

increase from 2022. This represents the number of direct sales opportunities for farm businesses created by farmers markets.

For many of the over 2 million shoppers, their only real contact with farmers is at their farmers market. Farmers markets are on the frontlines of teaching people, one by one, where their food comes from and helping them to create personal connections to farmers and specific places. Farmers markets help people care about food, farming, and agriculture.

Farmers markets help launch beginning farmers who are learning to manage food production, marketing, and running a business. New farmers get direct feedback from their customers (their "blacktop R&D department") every week about what they like, how much they will pay, and how to set up the best presentation in the booth. Farmers market managers and other vendors also offer a built-in network to share resources, problem-solve issues, and offer help when life intervenes as well as celebrating the season's victories.

As with other forms of direct marketing, farmers markets allow farmers to decide for themselves which varieties of crops to grow or livestock breeds to raise, helping to keep heirloom varieties and heritage breeds in production and in the marketplace. At farmers markets, shoppers can still find their favorite varieties and try varieties that are not available in grocery stores.

King County Farmers Markets Support Small Businesses & Entrepreneurship

Farmers markets range widely in terms of the number of small businesses they serve. The total reported number of all vendors selling at King County farmers markets in 2023 was 2,323, a 13% increase from 2022. This represents the aggregate number of direct sales opportunities small business created by farmers markets and the scale of impact that they are making.

Farmers markets are low-risk ways for farmers, who have their resources spread thin, to launch a new business. With a booth and minimal infrastructure, farmers and other entrepreneurs learn about food safety, risk management, signage requirements, weights and measures, food access programs, and payment options. The farmers market's organizers do the back-end work to attract shoppers, secure the location, provide public safety, and create a fun atmosphere.

Among the 160 microenterprises in King County that have a Cottage Foods Permit from the WA State Department of Agriculture, farmers markets are an important sales outlet for bakers and other homebased food processors. Being able to work from home and part-time allows passions and talent to grow into a meaningful income stream. It also allows people to adjust their schedule to other demands on their time, keep costs down, and know they are in full compliance with food safety and labeling standards.

King County Farmers Markets are Essential Food Access Partners

Farmers markets do much of the back-end work so that farmers can participate in SNAP, SNAP Market Match, and the WIC and Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program (FMNP). This includes training, promotions, following USDA regulations, and a lot of accounting. In 2023, there was a major transition from paper checks to an electronic benefit for WIC and Senior FMNP participants. Farmers market staff and volunteers do much of the one-on-one training and shopper education so farm vendors can focus on farming and selling.

In 2023, statewide, WA families used over \$4.3 million in food access benefits to buy fresh fruits, vegetables, and other staples directly from farmers and food businesses at farmers markets. This is a win-win-win for local families, businesses, and markets.

King County typically reports the highest total redemptions in the state for the Women Infants and Children (WIC) and Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program. In 2022, \$613,340 in WIC and Senior FMNP benefits was spent by low-income shoppers at King County farmers markets, representing over 35% of the statewide total. Unfortunately, 2023 data by county for the Farmers Market Nutrition Program is not yet available due to the transition from paper checks to electronic benefits. Available FMNP data reports that:

- Statewide, the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program grew 13% in 2023. Low-income seniors
 receive \$80 to spend on fresh fruits, vegetables, herbs, and honey at authorized farmers markets and
 farm stands.
- Statewide, the Women, Infants, Children (WIC) Farmers Market Nutrition Program grew 2% in 2023.
 Families received \$28 to \$84 to spend on fresh fruits, vegetables, and herbs at authorized farmers markets and farm stands.
- For the first time in 2023, WIC participants were able to use their "Fruit and Vegetable Benefits" at farmers markets, totaling \$47,312 in direct sales to farmers statewide.

The Washington State Department of Health is able to report the total sales for authorized growers by county where they are located and by year. (Data does not indicate where the sales were made.) Collectively, King County growers' FMNP sales were nearly \$150,000 in 2023, a 46% increase from 2022.

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) was accepted at 31 King County farmers markets and Pike Place Market in 2023. The total sales of SNAP at farmers markets in 2023 was over \$511,269, a decline of 11%. The statewide SNAP Market Match program, which matches SNAP up to \$25 at participating farmers markets and farm stands, declined 10% in 2023 to \$498,998. Anyone with SNAP can use SNAP Market Match to buy fresh fruits, vegetables, cut herbs, mushrooms, and food-producing plants starts at farmers markets.

The City of Seattle runs an additional food access program called "Fresh Bucks." Farmers markets in Seattle accept Fresh Bucks, along with other retail partners such as farm stands, independent grocers, and supermarkets. Publicly available data for the Fresh Bucks program is not broken out by farmers markets and not included in this report. Please see <u>https://www.seattlefreshbucks.org/</u> for more information.

In addition, many farmers markets and vendors give generously to their local food banks or pantries. The total number of pounds donated in 2023 increased 1% to over 136,000 pounds from 42 farmers markets. This does not include markets that did not track donations, partnered with gleaning organizations, or if donations were made by vendors directly to the food bank or pantry.

King County Farmers Markets Bring Communities Together

Nearly 70% of farmers markets are run by community-based nonprofit organizations. The market manager, seasonal staff, and volunteers ensure compliance with food safety, insurance, and other financial responsibilities, as well as administering food access programs, planning farmers market promotions, managing vendors, and ensuring the smooth market day operations.

In 2023, King County farmers markets reported a total of 1,151 volunteers, representing an increase of 62%. Farmers markets outside of Seattle are far more reliant on volunteers to support their operations and organizations. This shows both the need for continued support and the dedication of community members to contribute to their farmers market.
